

About the Newsletter

Forest Fires (with help from Nova Peters)

There has been an increase in wildfires in the interior and northern BC. These fires have many consequences. Many people have had to evacuate because of the smoke and flames. Some Old Growth Forests were threatened, and many forests burned, causing loss of habitat and sometimes loss of life for Animals. In BC, 40% of these fires are human caused, and sometimes they can be devastating.

Many Indigenous communities have had to move because of forest fires and not been permitted to help with managing the fires even though they have advanced experience and knowledge passed down through the generations.

Forest fires can be beneficial when done as a controlled burn. Many Indigenous cultures have used controlled burns for things such as pest control, creating fresh grass patches for animals of prey, keeping natural fires at a manageable point by removing brush and things that are fire starters, and many more.

Natural wildfires aren't as bad & some tree species need the hot temperatures to melt the wax on their seed pods.


So some forest fires can have benefits, but as we've seen this summer, too many are not a good thing.

If a Tree Falls by Nikki Tate: Orca Book Publishers










Glossary

These are our definitions based on our understandings.

Animal of prey: An Animal that is being hunted by another Animal or by people.

Beneficial: Something that has a good outcome or impact.

Controlled burn: A burn that some Indigenous tribes practice where they start a fire at a single point so the animals have a chance to run away. They usually do it in a season before the main wildfire season so that natural fires aren't as bad because the controlled burns clear away the brush.

Evacuate: When people have to move from where they are because of a crisis like a wildfire.

Habitat: An Animal's home. Includes Plants, other Animals, the soil, the weather, and more.

Invasive species: A species that has been introduced and crowds out native species which naturally grow there.

Seed pods: The protective outer layer that some Plants have around their seeds.
