


About the Newsletter

Fact check:

Although allelopathy is real, it is a minor part of tree communication. Trees also warn each other when they are in contact with danger (such as beetle infestations or a wildfire). They do this through mycorrhizal fungi and pheromones to warn them so that they can, for example, if there's beetles, put out sap so the beetles drown. Trees sometimes even keep a stump alive after it was cut down or fell down, which is an example of cooperation rather than competition. Forests are wonderful examples of communities. By choosing to focus on allelopathy instead of all the other things, this page is giving off the impression that trees are unintelligent, insignificant, vulnerable and evil, exactly what the logging companies want, so that logging will be justified.

We don't want anyone to get hurt at their work. We have some concerns about the first sentence in this answer, however. Forestry jobs are becoming fewer and fewer because equipment is becoming more efficient and it takes one person to operate a machine to cut down 20 trees, versus 10 people to cut down one. Besides, there are a lot more environmentally friendly job options with standing forests such as tourism, maintaining the forest, school tours, invasive species removal, and food harvesting (for example, maple syrup, nettles, and more). To conclude, forestry is becoming less and less of a career opportunity in general and there are many other ways to make a living working **with** the forests.

List of Advantages of Deforestation

1. It produces lumber and charcoal.

Through this method, people can extract natural resources, such as timber and charcoal, which can be used to benefit industries and businesses for commercial and economic growth. **But** when we burn charcoal and wood we are making more carbon dioxide and speeding up global heating. Economic growth doesn't have to be problematic in itself, but the way it is happening spells disaster.

2. It offers job opportunities.

As deforestation increases demand from the lumber, manufacture, transportation and construction industries, more people will be needed to get the job done, thus an increase in employment opportunities. But with logging equipment becoming more efficient, jobs are becoming fewer and fewer.

3. It removes diseased trees.

In some cases, trees are being removed simply because of being dead or diseased. Through deforestation,

these trees will be replanted with new, healthier ones. **But** the forests would naturally regenerate on their own, meaning that this logging is meaningless and harmful.

When they replant, they will all be the same age and species, leaving little room for it to evolve into a thriving, diverse ecosystem. Not to mention all the chemicals that are used. Plus, any progress that has been made will likely be cut down in 20 to 50 years, all at once, leaving room for invasive species to take over once again. It is a vicious cycle.

4. It provides residential land.


One common alternative use for cleared lands is residential development, which can contribute to the easing of house prices and more land to build on. **But** with clear cutting, it leaves no trees to provide shade for the people living there. Also, in the process, they are washing away topsoil and destabilizing the ground on which the houses are.


5. It allows for more agricultural land.

By clearing out a section of woodland, people will have sufficient land space for agricultural purposes, allowing for the growing of crops. This means that food output will be increased for the local area. **But there** are more problems with current agriculture practices than good, and promoting it means promoting a damaged system. Also, we are losing essential forests that are vital to survival of the planet.




One of his wildlife guides, though this one is for wildflowers instead of birds.

Glossary

These definitions are based on our own understanding, plus research.

Infestations: When something, in this case beetles, takes over in large numbers and harm the place they are taking over

Invasive Species: a species that has been introduced and crowds out native species which naturally grow there.

Mycorrhizal Fungi: the partnership of a plant root system and a fungus's mycelium; when they grow together, the mycorrhizae bring benefits to both. Also called fungus roots.

Vulnerable: lacking protection; exposed to risk
